Recipe Swap - April 16

It is scientifically proven that our senses, particularly taste and smell, have a direct link to our memories. The smell of a fresh baked pound cake can transport us back to our grandmother's kitchen. The taste of a special sweet can remind us of holidays gone by. For this reason, food and recipes play a huge role in our sense of identity, culture, and community memory! On April 16 at 6 PM, join us for a recipe and memory swap! CHEESE FONDUE

One cup scalded milk, I tablespoonful butter, I cup soft bread crumbs, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoonful salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ pound of cheese, 3 eggs. Mix the bread crumbs, butter, salt, grated cheese and milk. Stir in the yolks of eggs beaten to a lemon color. Fold in the stiffly beaten whites, pour into a buttered baking dish and bake 20 minutes. Press with finger to test. Serve for luncheon or entree at formal dinner.—Mazie McFarland, Teacher Domestic Science, Goldsboro High School.

CHEESE STRAWS

One quart flour, 1 lb. cheese (grated), 1 heaping tablespoonful of lard, 1 cup milk (sweet), $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoonful cayenne pepper. Put cheese, lard, milk and pepper in boiler, let melt together. Put baking powder and flour same as for biscuits; make up with melted cheese, etc., and roll out thin, cut in strips and bake a light brown.—Mrs. W. H. Godwin, Goldsboro.

CHEESE AND NUT SANDWICHES

Chop ½ cup of nut meats fine, and mix a cup of cheese chopped fine, add a dash of salt and pepper if they seem to need seasoning. Spread between slices of white bread. If desired this sandwich may further be improved by putting between the folds a crisp lettuce leaf.

GINGER AND NUT SANDWICHES

Mix thoroughly I cup of finely chopped pecan nut meats, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup candied orange peel chopped very fine. Add to the above about 4 tablespoons of ginger syrup, 2 tablespoons of vinegar, a little dash of salt. Spread between thin unsweetened wafers. These are delicious served with tea.—Mrs. T. L. Ginn, Goldsboro, N. C.

A pillar of research and genealogical discoveries are the scrapbooks made by those before us. Scrapbooks hold valuable information on our ancestors. Things like photos, letters, or newspaper clippings tell a story that offers us a unique look into someone's life, through their own eyes. What they found important enough to immortalize tells us more about a person than the preservation itself. A great example is the scrapbook of Frank Hinnant and his preservation of Goldsboro's Boy Scouts in the 1940s. It's thanks to Frank Hinnant, Bill Moon, and Conway Rose, and many others, that our collection is flourishing with details and discoveries that give us a personal look into the Boy Scouts of that era.

That's Old News!

Scrolling through reels of our Goldsboro News Argus microfilm collection is a great way to get a glimpse of Wayne County's past! This full-page advertisement from June 10, 1944 is a call for the people of Goldsboro and Wayne County to buy war bonds. This advertisement, just four days after D-Day, leans heavily on the invasion as a tactic for encouraging people to buy the bonds. A short paragraph in the middle states that the invasion has occurred and this is the "beginning of the end." This sense of urgency and patriotism encouraged Americans nationwide to contribute over 180 million dollars in war bonds over the course of the war.
