Who was Marion Hargrove? The Mount Olive Boy Who Made It Big

Marion Hargrove is a name that, when mentioned in our community, may - or very well may not - ring a bell. But it should. Hargrove was a Wayne County native who eventually found fame as a successful author and screenplay writer.

He was born Edward Thomas Marion Lawton Hargrove, Jr. on October 13, 1919 in Mount Olive. He spent the formative years of his childhood in Wayne County before moving away when he was 10. In 1927, an injury to his leg left him stuck in bed to heal for several months. During that time, he found his true loves: reading and writing.

Hargrove wrote for his high school paper before being hired with the *Charlottes News*. In 1941, when he was drafted into the Army, the paper asked him to continue writing a column which was called "In the Army Now." Later, the columns were compiled into a book titled *See Here, Private Hargrove!* Its success was overwhelming and it was later turned into an MGM Studios feature film starring Robert Walker and Donna Reed. This was the launch of a highly successful

writing career for Hargrove. All of this excitement occurred while he was still enlisted. When he was discharged, he didn't publish another work until 1948. But from then on, his career took off and he became the man behind some of Hollywood's most recognizable productions.

Marion Hargrove continued...

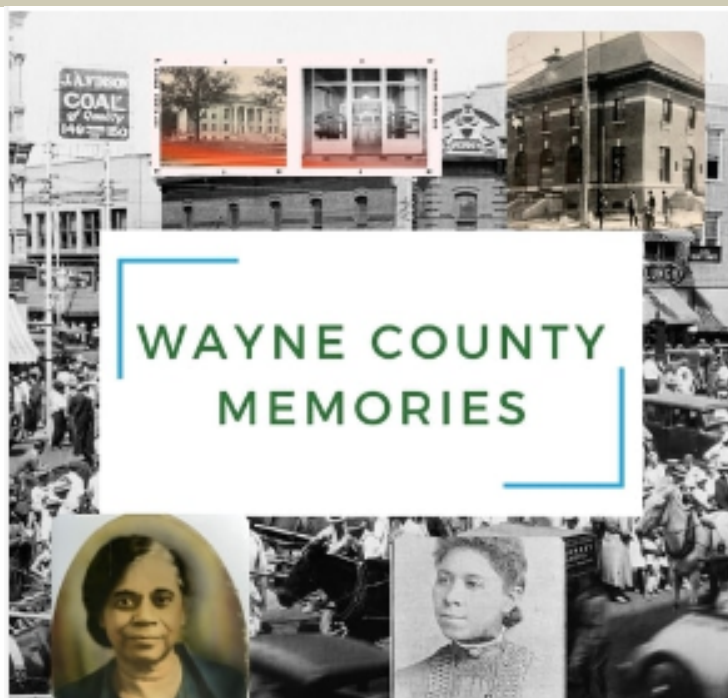
In 1956, Hargrove published *The Girl He Left Behind*, which was made into a movie starring Natalie Wood. After that, he moved to California to focus on writing for television and movies. He became a principal writer on *Maverick* and also wrote episodes of *The Waltons*, *I Spy*, *Fantasy Island*, *Eight is Enough*, and many others. He also wrote screenplays for multiple films, including *The Music Man*. This was undoubtedly a career highlight for which he won the award for Best Written American Musical.

In 1997, Hargrove agreed to donate his personal collection to Steele Memorial Library. It consists of manuscripts, articles, photographs, letters, and so much more.

Hargrove passed away in 2003, but his legacy as a Wayne County native who made it big lives on.
