his summer, 48 rising first through eighth graders participated in the Learning Studio Tutoring Program at First Christian Church in Goldsboro. Using space upfitted by the church, students who were behind in reading with suspected or diagnosed learning differences received targeted interventions in a 4:2 student to teacher setting. The space was outfitted with flexible seating, modern worktables setup for multi-sensory learning, and a resource library of assistive items, learning games, and high interest books.

An outside space allowed for students to have targeted "brain breaks," allowing for additional multisensory learning as well as balance work. Studies show that balance and coordination are linked to literacy levels by stabilizing eye movement for reading, and movement allows for higher-order thinking. Plus it helps with stimulation and focus.

Over the course of 10 sessions, participants used a variety of resources Department of Natural and Cultural and curriculums to not only gain reading skills but to work on balance, confidence, and social-emotional skills. On average, children showed one years' growth in reading, with some showing as much as two to three years' growth. "My child loved his tutor. He got the support he needed while having fun. I always heard a lot of praise and positive encouragement coming from the tutors during sessions. This has helped my child's confidence tremendously," said one parent. To further boost the work of the program, Worrell Contracting and Goldsboro YMCA provided each participant with a parting gift to set them up for success this school year.

This project is made possible by funding from the federal Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) under the provisions of the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) as administered by the State Library of

North Carolina, a division of the N.C. Resources (IMLS grant number LS-253645-OLS-23). Thanks to support from partners such as First Christian Church, Wayne County Public Library Foundation Inc., and the Friends of the Wayne County Public Library, tutoring will be extended throughout the fall semester.

This exhibit offers the hometown perspective of Wayne County through news articles, stories of the "boys" overseas, and the history of those left behind on the Wayne County home front.
